Human Rights Social Witnessing Resumes March 22nd

Our Black Lives Matter vigil has for many years operated on the premise that our Black and Brown neighbors were under the most oppression in our community and therefore in most need of support. At this particular time the threats to members of our community have grown to include many more identities such as but not limited to: Immigrants, Women, Transgender lives!

Therefore we are expanding our vigil as a Human Rights Matter Vigil. That means you may come with signs that reflect our concern for those identities as well as Black Lives.

We want our signs to reflect our Values with Love at the center.

Policy Board Meeting Summary March 10, 2024 Virtual First Unitarian Church of St. Louis

The Trump Administration recently rescinded a long-standing guidance policy that required Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) agents to refrain from immigration enforcement actions in certain sensitive areas, including in and around places of worship. The Policy Board discussed and edited a draft policy to guide the Church minister, staff, leaders, and greeters should an ICE agent seek to enter the First U church building. The draft is being circulated to the Church Council, Sabbatical Committee, staff, and others for review and input before further discussion and a possible vote at the April Board meeting.

The Board also adopted a First U Conflict and Conduct Policy, an official statement reminding Policy Board members and other leaders that we must act with undivided loyalty to the Church and congregation. We will disclose any actual or potential personal or financial conflicts and recuse ourselves from discussions and votes if any conflicts arise.

We moved forward with the Vision Statement process. The next step in adopting a Vision Statement is to present three choices to the congregation through a Survey Monkey poll. The Board will discuss the results at the April meeting, allowing the final choice to be presented to the congregation at the Annual Meeting.

Sabbatical Message from Rev. Kim

Our bodies tell stories, and I don't mean like *Memento*, the 2000 mystery thriller film where a man unable to form short term memories tattoos himself with details he wants to remember. I mean more like *Bones*, the Fox mystery series where a Forensic anthropologist partners with the FBI to solve murders. The scientists on the show can look at a body and tell much more than what killed a person. The bodies have signs showing old injuries and repetitive habits, clues to diet and environment, evidence of pregnancy and even trauma. Our bodies tell stories, and not just when we're dead; at the chiropractor's office this week I learned that I clench my jaw in my sleep. How was I supposed to know that?? I'm asleep! But my body held the evidence.

Monday, March 17th is the one year anniversary of breaking my back. From the outside, I look fully recovered. Yet, the muscles of my back, abdomen and hips continue to tell the story of three months in a back brace. And under examination, my L1 vertebrae will always show the history of the fracture. More than that, my body continues to tell the story of the break when I feel a rush of fear while climbing a ladder, with each flashback as I pass the particular fence I tumbled off of.

We live in a culture hyper focused on the appearance of our bodies, but determined to suppress the messages we receive from them. How often are we expected to push through or ignore pain? How often do we dismiss feelings of unease or discomfort? How often do we silence both feelings of hunger as well as satiation? *All the time*.

For the past two and a half months I have been taking an improv class based on methods developed by Viola Spolin (mother of Paul Sills, the founder of Second City in Chicago). The goal of Spolin's improv methodology was to create from a settled nervous system. In her methodology, the goal is not to tell the audience things with words, but to show the audience things with our actions, with our bodies. Can you imagine communicating pain or unease without words? How about hunger or satiation? Of course you can because our bodies are telling stories all the time. So Spolin's methodology forces you to be present to your body. To exist in the moment and to feel. Easy, right?

No, of course not! To exist in the right now is to acknowledge all that is going on around us: mass deportations, economic uncertainty, international disputes, challenges to civil rights, and more. To feel is to experience fear and grief, loss and pain, trauma and disconnection. Our bodies hold all this for us even if we never say a word, even if we never admit it to ourselves. This week is the five year anniversary of the COVID-19 shutdown. Our bodies told a story then too, such as the increased number of broken toes from people not wearing shoes in the house. Our bodies tell stories even now from the pandemic, such as long COVID.

Jesuit priest and scientist Pierre Teilhard de Chardin famously said, "We are not human beings having a spiritual experience. We are spiritual beings having a human experience." To survive this time we must be present to this duality. To survive this time we need tools that settle our nervous system so we can be creative and powerful. To survive this time we need to be present to the fullness of humanity - which includes the bodies we inhabit.

As I continue to learn, I am focusing on my body. I am doing this by getting enough sleep, going to the gym, seeing health care providers, booking massages, spending time outdoors, eating well and more. This feels like privilege, but what part of caring for our bodies is privilege? It is a capitalist consumer mentality that says only some bodies deserve care. Until we live in a society that honors the care of all bodies, we help each other. When our friends and neighbors don't have the resources to focus on their bodies, we help: we defend Medicaid, we contribute to food banks, we volunteer at shelters, we advocate for public parkland.

We understand that "the body" isn't just our own body, but the community, the body of people that makes up this place. When we take care of "the body" we build strength and connection. When we take care of our bodies, all bodies, we have capacity in our heads and hearts for the work ahead. When we

take care of our bodies and "the body" we have the ability to think and feel our way forward into new ways of being. When we look back on this time at some future date, what story will your body tell?
