Lisa Richter and Bob Mai have been married for 49 years and together joined First Unitarian of St. Louis last month. They live on Waterman Boulevard near the church in the Central West End and originally moved to St. Louis in the 1970's from the east coast. They are getting involved in First Unitarian's Social Justice committee and its activities.

Bob Mai is interested in how a church and its congregation can work to strengthen a community. Bob has worked in academia as well as business. With a doctorate in education (EdD), he designed and led an experimental program in staff support for the St. Louis Public Schools, worked at KETC Channel 9 to develop alternative revenue streams and built an on-air program "Growing Together" with the late Kathryn Nelson and developed a training business at Maritz. At Saint Louis University he taught courses in education and organizational development. At the Brown School at Washington University, he taught courses in management for social workers. He's written two management books; one is titled Leader as Communicator. Bob was also in the Peace Corps in Nigeria for two years.

Lisa Richter and the couple's two adult daughters (now in their '40's, each married with two children) were members of Eliot Chapel in Kirkwood from 1987-2000. At Eliot, Lisa taught Sunday School, served on the board and participated in volunteer activities including Room at the Inn. Like Bob, she is interested in once again joining a religious community to meet new people and find ways to serve our community and the congregation. She owns a market research business, Stakeholder Insights, LLC, and previously worked in marketing, PR and market research at FleishmanHillard and the United Way of Greater St. Louis. Lisa began her Unitarian experiences in the Washington, D.C. area at Cedar Lane Unitarian Universalist Church in Bethesda, MD in the 1960's as a teenager. Her parents were originally raised Lutheran, moved to a Congregational church in Minneapolis and joined the Unitarian church when the family moved to Washington.

First Unitarian Church of St. Louis Policy Board Meeting Summary October 14, 2024 Virtual

The Policy Board had a packed agenda and productive meeting in October.

The Board had a thoughtful conversation about creating a process to engage a broad and diverse group of church members in developing a vision statement for the church. Board members designed a two-phase process. Phase 1 begins now! Please see the church e-blasts for details and join Board members for one of four small group visioning sessions during November and December.

The Board approved a motion to alter the terms of our building insurance policy for 2024. Our insurance carrier proposed a \$138% increase in the church's building insurance premium, from \$25,000 to \$51,780. The Board voted to make several changes to our building insurance policy that will reduce the 2024 premium to \$36,067. The changes include reducing our co-insurance to 80%, increasing the deductible to \$75,000, reducing the personal property coverage to \$750,000, and reducing the business income coverage to \$125,000. However, these changes still mean a premium of about \$11,000 more than we budgeted for 2024. We will be considering additional changes for 2025.

The Board also voted to accept the Church Council's recommendation to convert the bookstore into a children's/family creative space. Stay tuned for more details.

Our new Remote Interim DRE, Michelle Townsend Grove, joined us for the Board meeting. She shared her ideas for her time with us, and Policy Board members shared some of their expectations, questions, and concerns about the future of our children's RE program.

Social Justice Learning Opportunities

As many of you know, the Social Justice committee has been involved with the WashU and Slavery Project, in collaboration with several other St. Louis Congregations. We are investigating slavery in St. Louis, and specifically First Unitarian and William Greenleaf Eliots's relationship to slavery. The following events may be of interest in that regard:

- There is an exhibit at the Law Library of St. Louis on Freedom Suits in St. Louis, through Dec. 3: https://llastl.org/slavery-freedom-suits
- There is also a talk Dec. 4 regarding Archer Alexander, who folks may remember was an enslaved man who William Greenleaf Eliot took in and protected, and then attempted to purchase, reportedly in order to emancipate him. Archer was later emancipated by the courts for his services to the Union army (informing on a plot against the Union). It is his likeness that the Emancipation Memorial in D. C. is modeled on. Here is the info about the talk:
